## Basic Question Structures in English

1. Identify the tense and subject of the sentence.

3. Invert the auxiliary/modal verb and subject.
4. Keep the main verb in its base form if using *do*.

# WH-Questions

WH-questions are open-ended and begin with interrogative words such as *what*, *where*, *when*, *who*, *why*, and *how*. These questions request specific information and follow particular syntactic patterns.

## Common WH Question Words

Each WH question word seeks different types of information. For example, *who* asks about people, *where* inquires about place, and *why* asks for reasons. Understanding their functions is essential for correctly formulating questions.

## Structure of WH-Questions

## Tag Questions

Tag questions are short questions added to the end of statements, often used to confirm information or seek agreement. They combine a positive or negative statement with a short interrogative phrase.

## Formation of Tag Questions

The tag question consists of an auxiliary verb and a pronoun that corresponds to the subject of the statement. The polarity of the tag is usually the opposite of the main sentence: if the statement is positive, the tag is negative, and vice versa.
